A corporate story not an individual one

Humanity desires to belong to a community where they experience mutual acceptance and concern, a mutual goal or mission. This is a God given desire because we were made in His image. He intends to fulfill it, not just with Himself, but by gathering a people and bonding them together by the Gospel.

REFRAMING OUR EXPECTATIONS

We must reframe our expectations to match what God expects of us

WHERE DO I GO FROM HERE?

People have a relational capacity. We are not able to have the same deep level of connection and vulnerability with a maximum number of people. However, it is wise and beneficial to have varying levels of connection with groups of people. Josh Meyers, in his book *The Search to Belong*, describes several spheres, or spaces, of relationship that are beneficial for people to have based on research in proxemics. (Daniel Im, No Silver Bullets, pages 115-117)

- Public space A space with 75+ people where you belong, a part of a community, and you somewhat get to know those around you, but there is not much of an opportunity to really get to know others because it is so large. (Example in a church context: a whole congregation)
- o **Social space** A space with 20-50 people. This is a large group where you are safe to decide whom you would like to grow a deeper relationship with. It is big enough that newcomers won't feel like they're the center of attention, yet it's small enough that no one will fall through the cracks. It's big enough that everyone will find someone to connect with, but it's small enough that meaningful conversations can take place without people being uncomfortable. (Example in a church context: a whole small congregation)



- o **Personal space** A space with 8-12 people. This is the typical small group environment where you are intentionally connecting with others to go deeper, sharing life together, praying with one another, and allowing yourself to be known. Private information is shared, but this isn't the place where you are completely vulnerable and baring your whole soul. (Example in a church context: a Bible study or Life Group)
- o **Intimate space** A space with 2-3 people. This is an environment that you only let a few people into. It could be a spouse, a best friend, or an accountability group. This is an environment where nothing is held back, and there is a lot of intentionality in sharpening one another, being accountable to one another, and being intentional in community. (Example in a church context: a few relationships within a group)

We have to learn to think about what these expectations look like with different spaces. We will have varying degrees of relationships and that is ok. We can observe in Jesus' ministry that He had a relational capacity in a sense. There were some who were closer to Him than others. Only a few saw Him in His most vulnerable time in the Garden of Gethsemane. To expect the vulnerability of an *Intimate* space with a broad range of people would be difficult. Also, to expect the type of relationship that *Personal* space describes with the whole church would be unhealthy. The good news is that the local church provides and environment where all spaces can thrive.
